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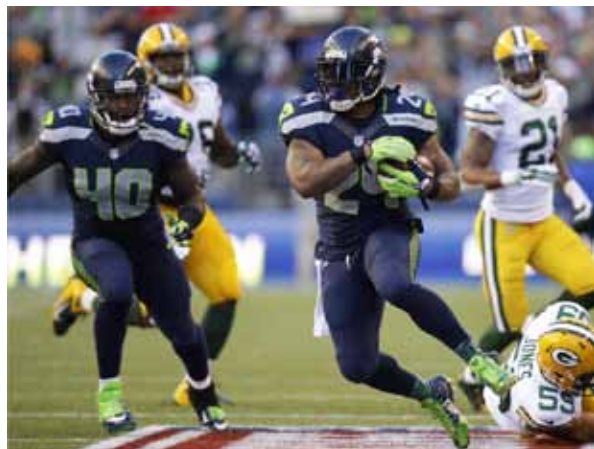

The man who made the Spanish-speaking world laugh

Charlie Chaplin reportedly called him the “greatest comedian alive.” Mexican actor Mario Moreno, or “Cantinflas” as he was known, starred in scores of films from the 1930s up to the 1980s. In Latin America, he’s a beloved icon. In the U.S., he’s best known for his Golden Globe-winning turn as the ingenious valet Passepartout in *Around the World in 80 Days*.

A new film about the legendary comic opens in U.S. theaters this weekend and will soon premiere in Mexico.

Cantinflas is so popular, he even changed the Spanish language. There’s a verb in Spanish: *cantinflear*. It means to talk in so many circles and puns that everyone ends up completely confused. It was the character’s signature move when caught in a tight spot.

He was a scrappy, mouthy, working-class hero, with a mustache like quotation marks around his mouth. He always saved the day, and he always got the girl.

In the new movie, Cantinflas is played

by Spanish actor Oscar Jaenada. True to form, the dialogue throughout the movie is filled with slang and double entendres. But will today’s audiences still find him funny?

Pantelion Films, the brainchild of Lionsgate and Televisa, is banking on it. The studio has been courting the booming

Latino market in the U.S. The film is mostly in Spanish — except for the scenes that take place in Hollywood where Michael Imperioli of *Sopranos* fame plays Mike Todd, the American producer who fights to bring Cantinflas to the U.S.

The film’s producers are betting not only that audiences will still find Cantinflas funny but that they will also continue to connect with his political satire. Lead actor Jaenada says that word for word, everything Cantinflas said in his films about politics rings true today in Latin America.

Early on in the biopic, there’s a scene in which a young, very poor Cantinflas goes to a fancy theater house and watches a satire about political corruption. In the audience, a bloated politician laughs raucously. “You see?” a friend leans over and tells Cantinflas. “In real life, they never admit their wrongs. But when they see them played out on a stage, they laugh.” Cantinflas took that advice and ran with it.

This is what made Cantinflas so beloved. Professor Juan Gabriel Moreno, who teaches theater at the Autonomous National University of Mexico, says Cantinflas’ revenge against the rich and authorities is the revenge of Mexico itself.

Gabriel Moreno says you have to understand what was happening in Latin America at the time: So much of the continent was under abusive oligarchic dictatorships. Cantinflas was just another guy trying to survive.

And when he bamboozled a cop or a politician, Cantinflas was just doing what an entire people fantasized about doing: talking back.

Mexico operations thwart child, family migrants

The largest crack down by Mexican authorities on illegal migration in decades has decreased the flow of Central American migrants trying to reach the United States, and has dramatically cut the number of child migrants and families, according to officials and eyewitness accounts along the perilous route.

Convoys of Mexican federal police and immigration service employees in southern Mexico have begun scouring the tracks of the infamous freight train known as “La Bestia,” or The Beast, hauling migrants from the rail cars and sending them to deportation centers. They have also set up moving roadblocks, checking the documents of passengers on interstate buses.

Associated Press journalists who followed the train one night this week as it left the southern state of Chiapas and entered neighboring Oaxaca noticed the drop-off, with just a few dozen mostly adult males perched atop the rumbling cars instead of the hundreds of men, women and children who were there not long ago. The men said they were the only ones able to evade capture. There were only two women and no children on the train.

“They took almost everyone” said Jorge Ruiz Williams, a 20-year-old Honduran migrant who avoided detention and was seated atop La Bestia on Tuesday night. “We escaped because we’re young and agile.”

When the authorities come, the migrants who once circulated openly in shelters and boarded the cars as they were being attached to the locomotive are forced to hide in the woods, where criminals lurk.

Some of the Central American men say that instead of trying to cross into the United States they’ll now stay and look for work in Mexico. Many families have apparently decided not to attempt the journey through Mexico at all since

news of the raids and checkpoints, — combined with stepped up efforts in the U.S. and among Central American governments — reached their communities, said Carlos Solis, the manager of a shelter in Arriaga. He said the city, once bustling with migrants waiting to board the train, emptied out almost overnight.

“The word spreads, one person tells another, and it goes down the line,” Solis said.

“They’re also going after the coyotes, so it is increasing the cost of the trip and making them move through less visible areas,” he said, referring to the smugglers paid to get migrants through to the U.S. border.

American and Mexican officials say they are noticing the same drop-off all along the route.

The roundups follow U.S. requests for help from Mexico, as well as Guatemala, Honduras and El Salvador.

On Aug. 7, the Department of Homeland Security released data showing the number of unaccompanied children and children traveling with a parent arrested along the Southwest border of the United States in July was roughly 13,000, half what it had been in June. DHS Secretary Jeh Johnson said the trend appeared to be continuing during the first week of August, and President Barack Obama said Thursday that numbers for the whole month will show a further decline.

“We’re seeing a significant downward trend in terms of these unaccompanied children,” Obama said in a news conference.

How to Spend Less Money on Everyday Items

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The fall season marks the start of new beginnings – new school years, new weather patterns and, for many of us, a new budget. If you're not careful about watching your spending, then fall can get expensive! There's back-to-school shopping, there are costs associated with winterizing a house and the holiday shopping season is looming. Fortunately, there are some easy ways to cut your spending on everyday items.

Saving at the grocery store

Saving on groceries is one of the easiest and most painless ways to cut your spending. The cost of groceries changes a lot depending on when, where and how you buy. By taking some simple steps, you can end up saving big.

- Start by choosing the most cost-effective store. This can be easily done by comparing the cost on a few basic items. Take a look at what milk, eggs, bread, lunch meat, or apples cost at three or four local stores. This will give you a good idea as to which store sells groceries the cheapest.

- After you decide on a store, be sure you have a plan for your next visit. Don't shop without a list. According to research from the University of Pennsylvania, people who can avoid impulse grocery shopping can save up to 23% on their grocery bills.

- Avoid pre-packaged foods. Although "do it yourself" items may be less convenient, they usually mean big savings. For example, buy frozen cans of orange juice and mix

it with water yourself, versus buying ready-to-drink juice.

- Consider paying for groceries with cash instead of a credit or debit card. It is psychologically more difficult for people to part with cash than a card. Plus, the cash serves as a physical reminder as to how much money you are able to spend at the store.

Saving on transportation

Saving money on transportation requires more of a lifestyle adjustment than changing grocery shopping habits, but the amount of money you're able to save by altering your transportation habits is also much larger.

- Carpool or take the bus to work. Cutting back on your amount of driving is the most efficient way to save money. Check out local bus routes or Google carpool partners. Rideshareonline.com is a great resource to help Washington, Idaho and Oregon residents manage their trips.

- Shop around for car insurance. Car insurance premiums vary drastically by company. Be sure you get three or four quotes before you sign up for a policy.

- Do it yourself. There are a few easy car maintenance steps that can usually be performed at home. Oil and light bulb changes and air conditioning tests are relatively simple and can usually be done at home.

Saving around the house

- Cutting your energy usage is one easy way to save money. Be sure to turn down your heat and shut the lights off when you leave the house. If you have trouble remembering, consider buying a thermostat that you can program.

- Watch the amount of water you use and how you use it. This is particularly important in the summer when water costs are typically more expensive. Consider running your dishwasher only when it's full and washing your clothes in cold water.

- Install light bulbs that use less energy. CFL or LED bulbs work well for this. These types of light bulbs do cost more initially but they both have a longer life than typical bulbs and use less energy, thus saving you money on your energy bill.

Saving on entertainment

- Invite friends over instead of going out. Next time you want to get together with your friends, consider hosting a game or movie night. If all of your guests bring a food or beverage,

then you'll save even more!

- Check out your neighborhood or city's community events. This is especially good to do if you have kids. Think about visiting local parks or swimming pools, fairs or farmers markets.

- Watch for discounts at local attractions. Many theaters, museums, galleries, zoos, etc offer discount days. Call the local attractions in your area and ask them what they offer.

- Cancel your cable or satellite service. You can stream shows and movies off the internet and watch local television using an antenna. (You'll also see fewer advertisements, meaning you'll be less tempted to buy something you don't need!)



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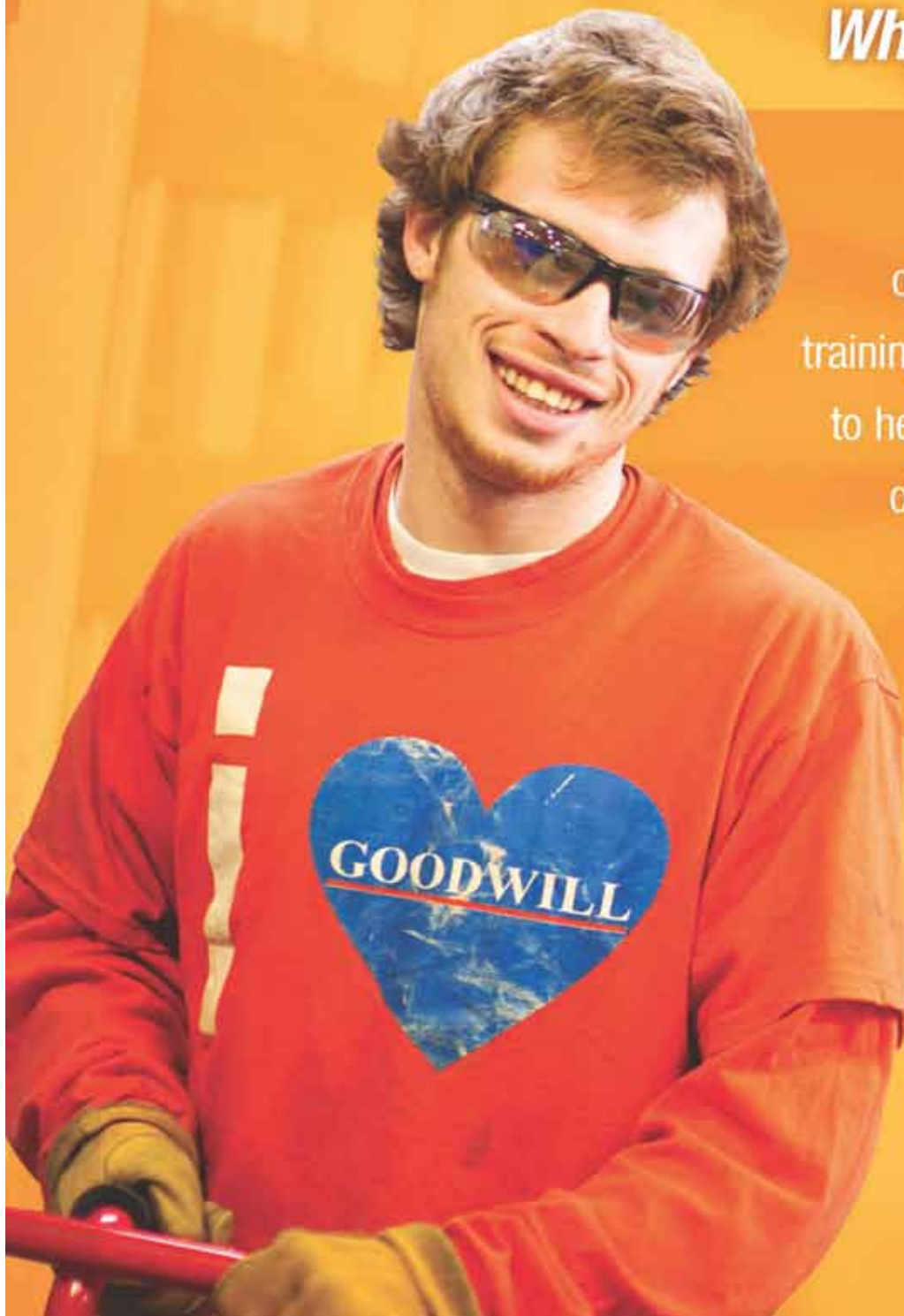

Fewer Hispanic and black police officers around the country

An Associated Press analysis of Census Bureau data and Justice Department figures about law enforcement found that Hispanics are more often underrepresented in police departments around the country than are blacks.

Some of the least racially or ethnically balanced police departments:

—Anaheim, California: More than half the community is Hispanic, yet only 23 percent of the police officers are. Theresa Smith, a member of the Anaheim Community Coalition, which aims to improve police oversight, said the city's Hispanic community has made more of an effort to improve relations than the police have, even with the appointment of a Hispanic police chief last year. Smith said not everyone in the community is inclined to call police for help. In February, Anaheim announced it will test a public safety board with nine residents who will review public safety budgets, practices and incidents such as police shootings. Police spokes-

man Robert Dunn said the department has been making strides in improving relationships with all the city's communities.

—East Haven, Connecticut: Nearly 9 percent of the population is Hispanic, with less than 1 percent of Hispanic officers in the police department. In 2011, the Obama administration found that the department consistently discriminated against Latinos by intentionally targeting them in traffic stops and retaliated against Latinos who complained about discrimination. Marcia Chacon, the Ecuador-born owner of My Country Store in East Haven said the atmosphere has improved dramatically since the abuse scandal that

led to the arrest of four local police officers in 2012.

Chacon wasn't concerned that Hispanics are still underrepresented in the police department.

"What's more important is to have police who do not pick on people because of their race," Chacon said.

—Ferguson, Missouri: About 65 percent of the population in the St. Louis suburb is black, while only 11 percent of the police department is, according to 2007 figures from the Justice Department. On Aug. 9, a white police officer shot and killed an unarmed black 18-year-old. Accusations of police discrimination and weeks of rioting followed.

—Waco, Texas: The community is more than 30 percent Hispanic, but in the police department of 231 full-time sworn officers, only 11 percent are Hispanic, according to the department.

—West Valley City, Utah: One-third of the population is Hispanic, yet only 6 percent of the police force was, according to the 2007 figures. In 2013, the Justice Department met with members of the Latino community and police in 2013 to address concerns about Latinos being unfairly targeted in drug cases. "They don't have a lot of Latino police officers," said Tony Yapias, director of the advocacy group, Proyecto Latino de Utah. "That was kind of the problem."

Politics trump promises on immigration

WASHINGTON (AP)

For years, President Barack Obama berated Republicans for putting their own political interests ahead of good policy on immigration. In two successive presidential campaigns, he held up Washington's failure to act on immigration as a prime example of the cynical decision-making he said must end in Washington.

Now that he is delaying his own immigration plan until after Election Day, Obama has opened himself to charges from Democrats and Republicans that he's just as guilty of playing politics.

The president's about-face, reversing a promise to take action near the end of summer, has left him with few allies going forward on an issue he had hoped would become a core component of his legacy.

Immigration groups are decrying what they see as a cravenly political move that puts their best interests yet again on the back burner. Republicans are far from appeased; they're accusing Obama of ducking accountability because he still plans to act, just not until after voters

go to the polls. Democrats, for the most part, are trying their hardest to stay out of it.

Obama's explanation for his decision to delay — that a summer surge in Central American children crossing into the U.S. illegally had poisoned the atmosphere for immediate action — did little to quell speculation that Obama had actually yielded to midterm politics. After all, nervous red-state Democrats had been complaining throughout the summer that voters would punish them if Obama took provocative, unilateral executive action now, such as deferring deportation for millions of immigrants.

"It's definitely politics," Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., said Sunday. Added Rep. Luis Gutierrez, D-Ill., a prominent immigration advocate: "Playing it safe might win an election ... but it almost never leads to fairness, to justice and to good public policy that you can be proud of."

For Obama, the decision to delay presidential action on immigration laid down a new marker in his evolution from the

young presidential candidate who in 2008 vowed to put an end to a political system in Washington driven by self-interest. That aspirational message helped galvanize support from a younger and increasingly diverse electorate — including millions of Hispanics.

But as president, Obama has found that promise among the most difficult to deliver — on more than immigration.

Over time, he's eased his own prohibitions on raising money for super PACs and on lobbyists serving in government, in each instance confronting the reality

that changing an entrenched system of government requires more than idealism and good will.

"There's an aspiration when you're running that you can really seize a bureaucracy by the scruff of the neck, but it's a lot harder to do than you think," said Douglas Brinkley, a presidential historian at Rice University. "Once you get to the White House, you deal with the milieu the best you can."

Even as he ran for re-election in 2012, with Washington still firmly jammed by partisanship, Obama predicted his re-election would "break the fever" because Republicans would know he'd never be on the ballot again. He blasted the GOP for withdrawing support for legislation allowing people brought into the U.S. illegally as children to stay, telling Latino elected officials in Florida, "The need hadn't changed. The only thing that had changed was politics."

As signs emerged in recent weeks that Obama would likely delay his immigration plans, White House officials struggled to find a rationale that didn't come down to pure midterm calculations.

Seahawks start season with 36-16 win over Green Bay

SEATTLE, Washington (AP)

The ceremony was brief, lasting less than 10 minutes. The Seattle Seahawks celebrated the accomplishment of winning their first Super Bowl title last season, unveiling the championship banner and giving their fans one more opportunity to savor the feat.

Then it was over, and the process of trying to repeat started in impressive fashion with a 36-16 romp over Green Bay on Thursday night.

Marshawn Lynch ran for 110 yards and two touchdowns, Percy Harvin had 100 combined yards rushing and receiving, and the Seahawks dominated Aaron Rodgers and the Packers.

Their effort against the Green Bay — a popular pick to contend in the NFC — will only reinforce the belief Seattle is still the favorite in the conference.

“We got a lot of playmakers just looking to get the ball,” Harvin said. “Every time we get a chance, we’re definitely looking to make the most of it.”

Russell Wilson was outstanding in the first half, including a 33-yard touchdown pass to Ricardo Lockette, and added a 15-yard TD pass to Derrick Coleman in the fourth quarter. Wilson finished 19 of 28 for 191 yards.

Rodgers struggled as the Packers were held to 255 total yards, the third-fewest for Green Bay since the start of the 2012 season.

Next up for the Seahawks is a showdown in San Diego against the Chargers on Sunday afternoon.
